## AJHA ANNOUNCES 2014 RESEARCH AWARDS

Nineteen scholars were honored for their research during the American Journalism Historians Association 33<sup>rd</sup> Annual Convention Oct. 9-11 in St. Paul. Minn.

Research Chair Linda Lumsden is not surprised by the number of outstanding papers from this year's conference, especially those involving collaborative work between faculty and students.

"I was really pleased to see Tracy Lucht and Chunyu Zhang of Iowa State University win the W. David Sloan Award for Top Faculty Paper because Chunyu is a graduate student," Lumsden said. "It's rewarding to see faculty working so productively with students."
