Getting a book manuscript published takes many steps, some of which can be difficult to navigate. Authors must work with editors and other publishing staff to go through the peer review process, agree on contracts, finalize manuscripts, review page proofs, complete indexes, select covers, and gain positive publicity. This panel of book authors and a book series editor will share advice on what questions to ask editors and publishers, how to work with them in the most productive way, and what mistakes to avoid. The panel will include plenty of time for questions and conversation with the audience.

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Sidney Kobre Award for Lifetime Achievement

John Maxwell Hamilton, of Louisiana State University, is the 2023 recipient of the Sidney Kobre Award for Lifetime Achievement.

Hamilton has authored or co-authored eight books and edited many more, in addition to publishing numerous articles. He was awarded the Goldsmith Prize from the Shorenstein Center on Press, Politics and Public Policy and the AJHA Book of the Year Award for each of his two most recent books, *Manipulating the Masses: Woodrow Wilson and the Birth of American Propaganda* and *Journalism's Roving Eye: A History of American Foreign Reporting.*

Prior to his tenure at LSU, Hamilton worked as a journalist for the *Milwaukee Journal, The Christian Science Monitor* and ABC radio and was a commentator for Public Radio International's "MarketPlace." His work has appeared in the *New York Times, Foreign Affairs, The Nation* and other publications.

Currently Hamilton serves on the board of directors of the International Center for Journalists and is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

National Award for Excellence in Teaching

Erin Coyle, an associate professor of journalism in the Klein College of Media and Communication at Temple University, was selected to receive the 2023 AJHA National Award for Excellence in Teaching.

The selection committee was impressed with the various ways Coyle incorporates history and study of primary sources into her courses, where she "focused on helping students acquire skills in analyzing primary sources, communicating their findings, and reflecting on the significance of their findings." The committee especially pointed to the media law and ethics courses, in which students engaged in such activities as review of 1954 editorials and articles cited by the U.S. Supreme Court in the 1966 case Sheppard v. Maxwell, in which Sam Sheppard was wrongfully convicted of killing his wife.

Committee members praised Coyle's innovative teaching during the pandemic, especially when it became clear some of her students did not have adequate internet connections. Coyle revamped classes so students could access all materials on their cell phones, which meant creating new materials.

The historical Black press has served as the mouthpiece for racial consciousness and empowerment, but more recently Black-created media content has also bridged that gap between



mainstream and advocacy media. The recent mainstream media coverage of "culture wars woke" on influences political, economic, and social dissent against Black/Brown individuals and other marginalized identities. In the post-Trump racial reckoning, local and state-wide policies have attacked the teaching of Black history and erased diversity, inclusion, and equity efforts in an attempt to reduce social change and diminish the systemic oppression still plaguing society's most disenfranchised communities. While the backlash on racial consciousness and progress isn't new, this panel will trace how the Black press/media has shaped social movements, such as Black Power and Black Lives Matter, through language, imagery, and advocacy to gain mainstream momentum and resistance.

Local Journalist Award for Outstanding Contribution to the Public Interest

Jerry Revish is an award-winning journalist who helped write the first draft of news history in central Ohio for more than four decades, delivering stories from throughout the community, across the state and around the world.

Revish launched his career in 1972 as a reporter at WBBW Radio in his hometown of Youngstown, Ohio. Revish was the first Columbus TV journalist to report from Saudi Arabia during the Persian Gulf War in 1990. His work from the region won an Emmy Award.

Revish helped Columbus bodybuilder Walter Smith — wrongfully convicted of rape — win his freedom through DNA testing. The Jerry Revish Restored Citizens Award — named in his honor — is given annually to an ex-offender who's excelled in his/her reentry to society. Revish has received many awards including 13 Emmys and four regional Edward R. Murrow Awards. He was inducted into the Ohio Broadcasters Hall of Fame in 2005.

Revish currently serves as senior pastor at Unity Temple Church of God in Christ in Columbus.

The 2023 Donna Allen speakers are **Edwina Blackwell Clark,** executive editor of the *Columbus Dispatch,* and **Angela Pace,** director of community affairs for WBNS-10-TV in Columbus.

This year's program will be a bit different in that AJHA's very own Caryl Cooper, emerita, University of Alabama, will be moderating a conversation with these two women.

Clark is a graduate of Ohio University and the University of Dayton. She has previously served as senior director of communications for the Alzheimer's Association of Ohio.

Pace has served as a liaison between WBNS-10TV and the Central Ohio non-profit community since 2006. She anchored the 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. editions of WBNS 10TV Eyewitness News for 13 years. She is winner of the 2006 Community Service Award from the Columbus Urban League.

This year's historic tour will feature one museum that you can explore in depth followed by an "Experience Columbus" option that allows you to explore one of Columbus's entertainment areas or return to the host hotel.

Our first stop is the Ohio History Center, headquarters of the Ohio History Connection. The Ohio History Center is a widely noted example of brutalist architecture, built in 1970 and considered the most architecturally significant public structure built in Ohio since the Statehouse. The architect, W. Byron Ireland, who worked on the St. Louis Gateway Arch, designed the Ohio History Center as one of his first commissions when the Columbus native started his own firm in the 1960s.

After our exploration of Ohio's past, our Local Host Committee decided that experiencing Columbus beyond the host hotel was in order. Your choices include the Ohio State University District, the Short North Arts District, the Arena District, and the Ohio Statehouse and Museum.

PANEL DISCUSSION: Covering and Violating Civil Rights in the Mid-Twentieth Century: Reconsidering Journalism Standards Thurber Conference

During the mid-Twentieth Century, members of the U.S. press reconsidered their professional roles amid calls to leave behind their World War II-era promotion of the United States, its allies, and its propaganda to provide more independent and socially responsible news coverage. This shift aligned with the postwar surge in the movement for Black civil rights, which intensified reporting on race in the 1950s and 1960s. The courts, as venues for historic contests over racialized power, produced newsworthy criminal trials and civil litigation that captivated audiences and framed the national narrative about civil rights. Although the white press reported on court proceedings and legal inequity, it also missed opportunities to expand understanding of racism and its effects, sometimes violating the civil rights of those it covered. Drawing upon primary sources, panelists will revisit significant court coverage from this period and will discuss what news coverage and archived correspondence reveal about journalists' rationales for how they reported on pivotal criminal cases, libel suits, and contempt of court cases involving members of the press during the civil rights movement. Panelists will discuss what these highprofile civil-rights related cases reveal about journalism standards in the mid-Twentieth Century. The panel will invite audience members to discuss implications for journalism history from panelists' findings about coverage of these civil-rights related cases and journalistic conduct during the mid-Twentieth Century.








Hotel Floor Plan
