Dr. Sidney Kobre is recipient of the American Journalism Historians first award for distinguished service. He is a founding member of the AJHA and the author of over 15 books in the field including *The Development of American Journalism*.

Dr. Craig Smith is president of the Freedom of Expression Foundation and author of *The 1850 Compromise* and *The Fight for Freedom of Expression*. His keynote address, "The Fear of New Technology and the Evolution of Content Controls," is made possible by a grant from the National Association of Broadcasters.

Father Walter J. Ong, S.J. is University Professor of Humanities, St. Louis University and an internationally known author and scholar. Proclamation

WHEREAS, the study of journalism history is an important and viable area of concern as it is difficult to understand the present and future of the mass media without knowing the past and how it developed; and

WHEREAS, the study of journalism history helps to place the role of the press in perspective and helps increase awareness of the First Amendment in our nation as well as in institutions of higher learning in a democractic society; and

WHEREAS, a key means of maintaining and increasing awareness, interest and commitment to the First Amendment is through regular instruction and research in the field of journalism history; and

WHEREAS, one of the primary means of communicating the philosophy, concepts, biography, economics, civil rights, ethics and struggle for freedom of the press is through journalism history; and

WHEREAS, journalism history also serves as the keystone of schools of journalism and programs in mass communication throughout the nation by providing perspective on the First Amendment; and

WHEREAS, it is essential that journalism schools and programs continue to work with the media to inform and educate the public concerning the history, role and purposes of

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN ASHCROFT, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MISSOURI, do hereby proclaim September 28-October 4, 1986, as

JOURNALISM HISTORY WEEK

in Missouri.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the Great Seal of the State of Missouri, in the City of Jefferson, this 3rd day of July, 1986.
